2023 SVAM Manufacturers' Expo

On August 31, the Southwest Virginia Higher Education Center in Abingdon was bustling with activity as it hosted SVAM's annual Southwest Virginia Manufacturers' Expo. The gathering brought together 19 manufacturing companies, vendors, suppliers, and specialized service providers, creating a vital platform for networking and education within the region's manufacturing community.

The Expo was a showcase of local manufacturing prowess, with various booths and exhibits featuring the businesses of participating manufacturers. It offered an invaluable opportunity for these local firms to expand their supply chains, demonstrate their expertise, explore new business opportunities, and tap into valuable resources to enhance their operations.

In addition to the exhibitor displays, this year's Expo featured two insightful breakout sessions. Dr. Zachary Collier, an Assistant Professor of Management at Radford University's Davis College of Business and Economics, led the first session titled "Making Decisions and Navigating Risks." The second session, "Make or Buy: How to Choose (It isn't as Easy as Flipping a Coin)," was presented by Dr. Cheryl Carrico, Engagement Manager at GENEDGE.

Long-time attendee Rhonda Holt of Samuel Pressure Vessel Group expressed her enthusiasm for the event: "The annual SVAM Expo is a day of networking and learning that I look forward to each year. I have attended the Expo for the past nine years, and every year, I leave with great business leads, new contacts, and fresh ideas. Training Opportunities for Membership

SVAM continued to meet member training needs with ongoing training offerings this quarter. Trainings were provided at no cost to SVAM Member companies. As part of its Supervisor Training series, in partnership with Virginia Tech's Southwest Center, SVAM offered the following trainings: "Communicating with Employees", "Time Management", and "Design Thinking and Problem Solving". Per a member request, SVAM also partnered with Baker Donelson to offer a virtual "Reasonable Suspicion" training.

Member-to-Member Connections

SVAM's Human Resources Peer Group members met twice during the quarter. Their first meeting was virtual. The group heard from Caitlin Cook from Ballad Health's Injury Prevention Program. The group then discussed successes across the companies represented including reduced turnover rates, employee celebrations for achieving new milestones, attracting more job applicants, a safety-themed week with employee involvement, and one company celebrated 200 days of accident-free work with generous rewards. In August, the HR Peer group was hosted by Woodgrain for a group discussion and company tour of their facility.



In September, SVAM's Environmental Health and Safety Peer gathered in Duffield to tour Komatsu Global and VFP. These tours allowed members to learn about both the manufacturing process at each company and the safety programs of these companies. Through networking and benchmarking, these opportunities help our members to support and strengthen one another.
